Case Writing Workshop

National Case Writing and Analysis Workshop in Association with AIMS, Hyderabad

With the changing time, the management education in India is also changing. More and more management Institutes in India are now adopting the "Case Method" for teaching the management theories and practices. The case method, as per the experts has upper hand in teaching management to students as it blends theory with real life situation in a class room environment. Students find this simulation of real business world in to a class room stimulating and challenging as compared to traditional teaching practice. This method also has an advantage of making class room sessions interactive as the students are required to provide their views on the situation being discussed.

Writing cases is a challenging task, but the learning outcomes that stem from their use can be rewarding. Case writing involves complex and reflective endeavors as well as the opportunity for creative expression. A case writer has to analyze, evaluate, interpret, and synthesize information and ideas. In fact, writing cases can enrich one's teaching and research. The writing process comprises four major activities: planning, organizing, drafting, and revising.

However the availability of relevant and quality cases is seen as constrain, faced by many faculty members while adopting this method of teaching. Realizing this shortage in availability of cases, Pioneer Institute of Professional Studies, Indore in association with Association of Indian Management Schools (AIMS) organized a *three day workshop from* 28th -30th March, 2011. The main objective of the workshop was teaching the participants better case writing techniques and effective tool for analyzing them in class.

Preparations for organizing the workshop began a month in advance which included sending emails and calling over phone potential participants at national level. Invitation letters to experts were sent to ensure that there is no last minute cancellation of scheduled lectures. After receiving the confirmation letters from various participants, the groups were formed comprising of faculties from the same functional areas i.e. *Information Technology, Finance, Human Resource and Marketing*.

The workshop began by an *Inaugural Lecture* by the much known personality *Dr. Nishint Dubey*, *Director*, *Maharaja Ranjeet Singh College*, *Indore*. Dr. Dubey started by explaining why we need a case and went on to discuss the structure and advantages of case

teaching. It is based on an in-depth investigation of a single individual, group, or event. Case studies may be descriptive or explanatory. Case study should be defined as a research strategy, an empirical inquiry that investigates a phenomenon within its real-life context. He said case study research means single and multiple case studies, can include quantitative evidence, relies on multiple sources of evidence and benefits from the prior development of theoretical propositions.



The Second Session of the first day was started by the eminent personality, Dr. P.N. Mishra, Prof., Institute of Management Studies, Indore. He began by defining a case and explaining the art of analyzing the case. He gave significant tips on solving the case and explained the history of case. He also discussed a classical case from Harvard, which is widely used by leading business schools.



The Third Session of the first day was started by Dr. V.K. Jain, Director, Pioneer Institute of Professional Studies, Indore, who focused the participants attention towards various ways of data collection for writing a case and finer details that involved experience of practicing managers for gathering quality information. This was scheduled in the post lunch activity as industrial visit by the participants. After lunch the participants in their functional groups were sent. The IT group visited Yash Technologies, **Finance** group visited **HDFC** Bank. Marketing group visited Bharti Axa and HR group visited Reliance HR Solutions.



The *Second Day* of "National Case Writing and Analysis Workshop" began by sharing of the participant's experiences while gathering information for case writing, followed by a session regarding the Do's and Don'ts of case writing by *Dr. V. K. Jain*. After this session, the participants had sufficient knowledge and information regarding the preparation of a case. It was a time now to give participants time and space to sit in ones own group and prepare a rough draft of the case, based on the information collected on the previous day. Before the participants call it a day, all the groups got ready with the printouts of their final drafts revised at least three times before taking a final print for submission.

Before the case presentations, *Mr. Yashveer Singh* gave a demonstration on the usage of *EBSCO*. He demonstrated how to use EBSCO Information Services, which is the leading service provider of e-journal, e-book and e-journal package and print subscriptions, e-resource management tools, full-text and secondary databases, and related services for all types of libraries and research organizations.



The Third Day began by presentation of cases by participants in groups, critical comments and suggestions by all the participants in a session which was chaired by Dr. V.K. Jain. He saw all the presentations, analyzed the appropriateness of the title, the contents, etc.

The presentation session was followed by lunch and informative session by Dr. Pawan Patni discussing the various approaches for teaching a case and tips to be given to students

for solving a case in examination. Case study refers to the collection and presentation of detailed information about a particular participant or small group, frequently including the accounts of subjects themselves. A form of qualitative descriptive research, the case study looks intensely at an individual or small participant pool, drawing conclusions only about that participant or group and only in that specific context. Researchers do not focus on the discovery of a universal, generalizable truth, nor do they typically look for cause-effect relationships; instead, emphasis is placed on exploration and description.



Photo Session and the Distribution of Certificates of participation marked the end of three day long National Case Writing and Analysis Workshop.

On 3rd February 2011, Brig. Kiran Kumar Thacker gave a motivating lecture to the students, where he covered the significance of various like Knowledge, aspects Management, Attitude, Aptitude, Communication Skills, where he stressed on the importance of speaking reading, writing, and listening skills. He focused on discipline, honesty, integrity, and target orientation. He said never to give up because we never know



where the finishing line is. He said, "Work appropriately, accurately and that too on time. Also keep doing your job and don't bother about results."

Information Technology for Organizational Excellence

A pioneering conception was bestowed to Pioneer Institute by *Prof. Sadique Khan* in *2010* with the development of *MIS Software*. This system is still into practice. The MIS Software generates Reports automatically regarding *Daily Lectures* taken by faculty, *CC Activities, and Extra Curricular Activities*. There is also a provision for precious *Suggestions* from the faculty and staff to improvise the schemes and the systems of the Institute. This



software is effectively functioning since then and is an imperative tool to make assessments.

New Initiatives

Classrooms are getting "smart" in the sense that teachers can connect to internet sources from their classrooms. Lecturing is done primarily to establish an intellectual and personal relationship with students and is further enhanced through *projects*, *term papers*, *weekly essay assignments*, *and midterm and final examinations*.

Explaining: Students visualize a problem, then use *reasoning and hypothesizing* to determine an answer.

Demonstrating: Demonstrations provide an opportunity learn new exploration and visual learning tasks from a different perspective. Faculty use experimentation to demonstrate ideas in class by reasoning or showing evidence. The uses of examples have become standard practice in the realm of textual explanation.

Collaborating: Collaborating allows students to talk with each other and listen to all points of view in the discussion. It helps students think in a less personally biased way. The faculty tries to assess the lesson by looking at the *students' ability to work as a team*, *leadership skills*, *or presentation abilities*.

Discussion: A different kind of group work is the discussion. After some preparation and with clearly defined roles as well as interesting topics, *discussions take up a major part of the lesson*, with the teacher giving a short feedback at the end or even in the following lesson. Discussions take a variety of forms.

Learning by teaching: The students take the teacher's role and teach their peers throgh PPT. This method is very effective. It is a great way to get the students to really study out the topic and understand it. By having them participate in the teaching process, it also builds self-confidence, self-efficacy, and strengthens, students speaking and communication skills. Students gain experience that could be very valuable for life.

Inquiry-based learning: It takes a lot of time, energy, and planning. Students practice *problem solving and critical thinking skills to arrive at a conclusion.* This teaching method is extremely student-centered and student-directed, and can be modified for students at any level, reaching them where they are.

Cooperative learning: It is another teaching method that is considered highly effective when done correctly. Students are put in small groups to work together. They are usually not grouped by ability, but put in a group with students at a variety of levels. The students are then given tasks to accomplish together.
