SESSION II: MR. SANDEEP ATRE

On July 9, 2011, Mr. Sandeep Atre, a very successful *Educational Entrepreneur* delivered and shared his experiences with students. The session was attended by **78** students of MBA. He focused on the Entrepreneurial Mindset. There is nothing

better for an entrepreneur than having a lecturer that enjoys entrepreneurship and embraces innovation in his career. He said that Entrepreneurial lecturers will always seek for a better teaching solution as well as being open for ideas and suggestions.

They will also understand circumstances and problems faced by students with entrepreneurial minds and best of all, other students might also be stimulated by the entrepreneurial mindset. By having the mindset, a lecturer will generally be able to pass the upcoming subjects listed below due to the improved teaching methods as well as the approach taken to educate students.

It is important to have a upper hand over technical subjects like accountancy, OM, OR, Statistics, engineering, biology, chemistry, physics or computer science, a qualification is important as it indicates that he or she possesses sufficient knowledge to be a Entrepreneur. Entrepreneurs love practical learning opportunities. One cannot effectively master certain skills like networking, communication, data mining, research, team work and leadership by just reading. Group activities, presentations, research reports and mock scenarios help to build the practical skills that are extremely useful for an entrepreneur. However, this may require an extra effort from the lecturers as some syllabuses do not take these activities into account.

SESSION III: DR. NISHIT DUBEY:

CHALLENGES & OPPORTUNITIES BEFORE AN ENTREPRENEUR

On August 16, 2011, Dr. Nishit Dubey, Director, MRSC, Indore was face-to face with the students. The session was attended by **72** students of MBA. He highlighted on Risk taking ability, Self-confidence, Decision making ability, Knowledge of cumin growing to harvesting technology, Economic motivation, Market orientation, Risk factors, Soil and firm condition of experiences, Water resources, Water quality and volumes, need to cumin for all technical factors, Ability of co-ordination to cumin related activities, Achievement, Motivation, etc. indicators are behavior of entrepreneurial.

Entrepreneurship has gained greater significance at global level under changing economic scenario. Global economy in general and Indian economy in particular is poised for accelerated growth driven by entrepreneurship. Admits environment of super mall culture we find plenty of scope for entrepreneurship in trading and manufacturing. An entrepreneur is a person who is able to look at the environment, identify opportunities to improve the environmental resources and implement action to maximize those opportunities. It is important to bear in mind the entrepreneurial skills that will be needed to improve the quality of life for individuals, families and communities and to sustain a healthy economy and environment.

The entrepreneurs provide a magical touch to an organization, whether in public or private or joint sector, in achieving speed, flexibility, innovativeness, and a strong sense of self-determination. They bring a new vision to the forefront of economic growth.

SESSION IV: SOCIAL ENTREPRENEURSHIP: SHRI P.C. JAIN

On September 24, 2011, Shri P.C. Jain, Chairman, Pioneer Group of Institutions delivered a lecture on Social Entrepreneurship. The session was attended by 57 students of MBA. He said that social entrepreneurship is the work of social entrepreneurs. A social entrepreneur recognizes a social problem and uses entrepreneurial principles to organize, create and manage a venture to achieve social change (a social venture). While a business entrepreneur typically measures performance in profit and return, a social entrepreneur focuses on creating social capital. Thus, the main aim of social entrepreneurship is to further social and environmental goals. Social entrepreneurs are most commonly associated with the voluntary and not-for-profit sectors, but this need not preclude making a profit. Social entrepreneurship practiced with a world view or international context is called international social entrepreneurship.

Social entrepreneurs are individuals with innovative solutions to society's most pressing social problems. They are ambitious and persistent, tackling major social issues and offering new ideas for wide-scale change. Rather than leaving societal needs to the government or business sectors, social entrepreneurs find what is not working and solve the problem by changing the system, spreading the solution, and persuading entire societies to take new leaps. Social entrepreneurs often seem to be possessed by their ideas, committing their lives to changing the direction of their field. They are both visionaries and ultimate realists, concerned with the practical implementation of their vision above all else.

Each social entrepreneur presents ideas that are user-friendly, understandable, ethical, and engage widespread support in order to maximize the number of local people that will stand up, seize their idea, and implement with it. In other words, every leading social entrepreneur is a mass recruiter of local change makers—a role model proving that citizens who channel their passion into action can do almost anything.

SESSION V: ENTREPRENEURSHIP AS CAREER OPTIONS: MR. ANIL GORANI

On October 13, 2011, Mr. Anil Gorani said that Entrepreneurs start new businesses and take on the risk and rewards of being an owner. The session was attended by **65** students of MBA. These students have finally decided to be an Entrepreneur or they are going to join their family business.

Some new ventures generate enormous wealth for the entrepreneur. However, the job of entrepreneur is not for everyone. You need to be hard-working, smart, creative, willing to take risks and good with people. You need to have heart, have motivation and have drive.

One of the best things about pursuing a career as an entrepreneur is the wide-open possibilities. There is room in many economies throughout the globe for entrepreneurship. There are many industries where wealth creation is possible be it the Internet and IT, personal services, media, engineering or small local business (e.g., dry cleaning, electronics repair, restaurants). But there is a downside of entrepreneurship too. Your life may lack stability and structure. Think about problems that people would pay to have a solution to. It helps to know finance. It's a must to really know your product area well. What do consumers want? What differentiates you from the competition? How do you market this product? A formal business plan is not essential, but is normally a great help in thinking through the case for a new business. You'll be investing more in it than anyone else, so treat yourself like a smart, skeptical investor who needs to be convinced that the math adds up for the business you propose starting.

Entrepreneurs have many personalities. A number never finished college. Some are fiery revolutionaries. Some are gentle souls with a good idea. Some are driven but difficult. Some have grown up in the most difficult circumstances imaginable - emerging with enormous determination to strive for greatness. Others are pleasant, personable and compassionate renegades. Generally, there will be a life event, key motivator or a source of inspiration that causes a person to strike out on their own rather than work inside a larger company. Sometimes it is cubicle fatigue or, worse, getting fired. Other times it is an "aha moment" where an insight or innovation into how an industry or business could be done differently arises. Sometimes it's a bad boss.

The possibilities in entrepreneurship are endless. The rewards can be high. And the risks are undoubtedly high too. But, if you have drive, creativity and the desire to be your own boss, this may very well be the career for you.

SKILL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (*November 24-26, 2011*)

In order to develop entrepreneurial skills amongst students, EDC conducted a three days Skill development program during Nov 24-26, 2011. **35** students participated in the program.

On day I, Mr. S. Nand focused on the need to develop the skills. The mission to fulfill the growing need in India for skilled manpower across sectors and narrow the existing gap between the demand and supply of skills.

There is a compelling need to launch a world class skill development program in Mission mode that will address the challenge of imparting the skills required by a growing economy. Both the structure and the leadership of the Mission must be such that the program can be scaled up quickly to cover the whole country. During his deliberations, he gave a Team – building Exercise to the participants. Also he focused on the management of stress in various situations.

On day II, Prof. Anish Patel delivered a lecture on Imparting Dignity to Vocational Education - A National Imperative. As we witness rapid changes in technology, economic growth depends on our ability to respond by way of harnessing and utilizing technology more effectively. Knowledge and skills go hand in hand to develop this ability. Development of human capital, therefore, depends on the evolution of skill sets, matched by newer and more effective ways of deploying these skills for sustainable economic prosperity.

Towards augmenting the skill base in the country and evolving a strategic implementation framework for vocational education and Training would require closer interaction and joint initiatives amongst all the stakeholders. The government is one of the important stakeholders and is responsible for policy formulation that includes an awareness campaign and an incentives scheme for facilitating development of institutions of vocational education. It is also important to develop a nationwide certifying mechanism that measures and grades different skills.

On day III, Prof. Veena Dadwani, Director Pioneer English and Personality Grooming Institute (PEPGI) highlighted on the Topic Five Entrepreneurial Skills You Need to Build a Successful Entrepreneur.

She started by saying that the first skill you must develop as an entrepreneur is your personal skill. Now what do I mean by personal skills? Personal skills are simply those skills that are attached to your personality, more like habits. They are the characters possessed by successful entrepreneurs. For instance; if you are a professional proofreader, then it's important you develop a keen eye for spotting errors.

When she talked about developing personal skill with respect to building a business, she was talking about developing entrepreneurial mindset. One needs to be in the right mindset before ever starting a business. If you carefully study the lives of successful entrepreneurs, you will observe they are courageous, passionate about their entrepreneurial calling and most of all, they think outside the box. To develop these personal skills, she recommended Characteristics of Successful Entrepreneurs and How to develop yours and the Traits of Successful Entrepreneurs.
