

### Field Work Survey

In order to encourage practical and real learning, the students undergo Field Work, where they do the empirical study. The students are given the Format of Field Work and a Format of the Submission of the Report.

The survey is done through Questionnaire Filling, Personal Interviews, and Observation Study etc.

Apart from the same, a part of the study is based on secondary data as well.

After the study is over, the students give a Presentation and Viva which is taken by the Expert/Faculty who has been allotted the field Work from the beginning of the semester.

### Standard Guidelines for Field Work Survey Report

- In the second semester of MBA, a student will carry out a Field Survey Project during CCAActivity.
- It is based on Primary Data or Information.
- Questionnaire may or may not be compulsorily required. It is depending upon the study.
- Sample size should be 10-15.
- It is mandatory for student to visit the field/area related to field survey topic.
- Maximum 2 to 3 visits are sufficient.
- Field survey report which carried out without visiting the field/ area related to field survey topic will be rejected.
- Field survey report carried out only on the basis of secondary data will be rejected.
- The following points keep in mind while writing a report of field survey.

It should be in proper format which is provided by R & D cell uploaded on website. Paper size should be A4.

Font Type should be Times New Roman.

Font size should be for Text 12, for Headings 14 & Bold and for Subheadings 12 & Bold.

Page Margins should be 1" for Top, Bottom, and Left & Right. Line Spacing should be single.

Submission of report should be in spring file only with soft copy in CD attached with file.

#### Format for Writing Fieldwork Assignment Reports

A fieldwork report falls into three general divisions: (i) preliminary section, (ii) the main text of the report, and (iii) the supplementary material.

### 1 Preliminary Section

Prior to the main body of the report, some pages of preliminary materials-title page, recommendation sheet, table of contents and acknowledgements-are presented.

#### 1.1 Title Page

The title page is a cover page of the fieldwork assignment report that should include the following information:

- (a) Title of the Report
- (b) Full name, Roll Number and T.U registration number of the student
- (c) Name of the campus
- (d) The place and date of the report

All the items of the title page should be centered between the margins of the page.

The title should be typed in capital letters. If the title extends beyond one line, it should be

1 1/2" spaced. (see Appendix 1.1 and 1.2).

#### 1.2 Recommendation Sheet

The faculty of Management, Pioneer Institute of Professional Studies may also require a recommendation

or a certificate of the supervisor and the Department Chairman of the campus. They should certify that the student has undertaken the fieldwork as approved by the Department. For a model of the recommendation sheet, see Appendix 1.2 and 2.2.

### 1.3 Acknowledgement

The student should write a preface. It should contain a brief statement of the purpose, scope and the organization of the report. In addition to this, thanks may be expressed to those who gave him substantial help, guidance, or assistance in completing the fieldwork project.

#### 1.4 Table of Contents

This occupies a separate page. It gives the readers a bird's eye view of the report and enables them to locate quickly each section of it. In addition to providing an easy means of referring to particular sections, it serves as an outline of the subject matters. The chapter headings should be typed in capital letters. The first letter of each word except to the preposition and article in sub-divisions should be in capital. These headings appear in the exact words or order that they are in the report, each followed by the correct page citation. An example of a table of contents is given in Appendix 1.3.

#### 1.5 List of Tables and Figures

In a fieldwork report having many tables and figures, separate lists of tables and figures are prepared and placed just after the table of contents. These lists of tables and figures occupy separate pages. These lists are prepared in the same form as the table of contents. Examples of the List of the Tables and List of Figures are given in Appendix 1.4 and 1.5 for reports written in English.

### 2 The Main Text of the Report

The heart of the report is, of course, the main text. Within the text, the writer presents the entire scope of the fieldwork assignment. The text, therefore, includes the main body from introduction to conclusion. The body of the report conventionally consists of three divisions-introduction, presentation and analysis, and summary and conclusions.

#### 2.1 Introduction

All reports require some introduction. The wider the scope of the report, the more extensive the introduction required. The introduction orients the reader. It gives him a clear understanding of the background, scope, and purpose of the study. The other information to be included in the introduction

chapter of a fieldwork are literature survey, the fieldwork procedures, and the data collection methods used. In short, the introduction tells the reader what the report is about,

what the writer did and how he/she went about it.

#### 2.2 Presentation and Analysis of Data

The discussion and analysis section is the heart of the report. This is the section in which data are presented and analyzed. The discussion of findings will normally be the longer section of the report. The writer must analyze the data by use of appropriate techniques which may include:

- (i) The data gathered must be examined in relation to objectives
- (ii) The data must be processed and grouped into several items or headings for their analysis
- (iii) The processed data should then be presented in the form of tables, charts, diagrams, figures, descriptions, historical narration, etc. to explain the relationships of the data analyzed.
- (iv) The use of analytical and statistical techniques should be made for better interpretation of data to draw inferences
- (v) The results should be explained in sufficient detail to enable the reader to have an adequate understanding of the work.

### 2.3 Summary and Conclusions

The fieldwork report should contain both summary and conclusions. These are not the same thing. A summary is a brief narration of the entire report including the major findings. This summary should give the reader an overall picture of the study. The report-writer should then draw out the significant conclusions and implications of the findings. A conclusion is thus a deduction based on the findings. Sometimes, the report-writer also proposes some recommendations which are in the form of suggested courses of action.

### 3 Supplementary Sections

### 3.1 Bibliography

The bibliography which is always required in a thesis or report follows the main body of the report. It tells the reader the sources of the researcher's information and gives a clear and complete description of these sources that were used in preparing the report. Generally, a bibliography should include all sources that had a direct bearing on the study, i.e. it must include every reference used in the footnotes and others of significance to the study.

### 3.2 Appendix

An appendix, if included, follows the bibliography. The appendix is a storehouse for the tabulations, charts, maps and other illustrative materials which are needed to substantiate points made in the text but are not closely enough related to the discussion to warrant their being placed in the text properly. Thus, the appendix is a section containing a variety of items that are concerned with the study. Such materials as questionnaire, survey instruments, checklists etc. are also included as appendix materials. Appendix

### Partnering-In-Presentation

The objective of this event was to overcome stage fear of the students and to motivate them through their strengths and work upon their weaknesses. The panel included Dr. Mona Tawar, Ms. Kumkum Sinha, Mr. Varun Keshari, Ms. Rashmi Farkiya, Mr. P. K. Tiwari, Mr. Durgesh Gaur and Ms. Veena Dadwani.





This activity ended up with a very positive outcome as students felt warmth, support, acceptance and care from the Faculty Members and Trainers. This training developed interpersonal skills, life skills, and communication skills and helped to take an initiative in students, both individually and in groups. Also employers often delve to hire students with strong skills - they want students' who have the ability to work well in a team and are able to communicate effectively.

The Panel highlighted that interpersonal skills comprise of Verbal Communication, Non-Verbal Communication, Listening Skills; how we interpret both the verbal and non-verbal message, Negotiation, Working with others to find a mutually agreeable outcome.

### Anti-Ragging Meeting: Pioneer Girls Hostel

On 26 August, 2014 An Anti-Ragging Meeting were conducted in Pioneer Girls Hostel. Dr. Mona Tawar briefed about the Rules and Regulation:

- 1. Ragging is strictly prohibited in any form; if someone found guilty, severe action will be taken.
- 2. Students are not allowed to consume alcoholic, narcotic drugs or any intoxicating substance in the hostel premises.
- 3. All visitors to the hostel including the parents/guardian will have to make necessary entries in the visitors' book available at the hostel entrance with the security guard.
- 4. Students should not keep any unauthorized property and unauthorized guests in her room.
- 5. No person, either guest or otherwise shall be permitted to stay overnight in any part of the hostel.
- 6. Any male member (even from family), are not allowed to enter at the girl's hostel without permission.
- 7. All girl students are expected to be back in the hostel by 8.00 in the night. If any student wishes to be away, should take permission from the hostel authority with appropriate reasons.
- 8. Students are responsible for the safekeeping of their valuables. Students should provide their own locks and should take proper care of their belongings.
- 9. Students are not allowed to arrange any group religious activities in their room.
- 10. Students are not allowed to take common room's newspapers to their room at any time.
- 11. Students are not allowed to take their meals/breakfast to their room at any time.
- 12. Students should handle hostel equipment's, furniture, mess property carefully and not abuse or tamper with it. If so then applicable fine will be charged by the hostel management.
- 13. Students have to use water and electricity judiciously. If fan, tube, etc., found ON in the absence of the students at their rooms, fine will be charged by hostel authorities.

- 14. Students should switch off the lights and fans when rooms are not in use.
- 15. Garbage and wastage only be put at garbage box available nearby hostel premises
- 16. Students during their stay in the hostel will be governed by the hostel management rules.
- 17. No student shall use the service of a hostel housekeeping person for personal work.
- 18. Students will not enter rooms of other students without permission of the inmates.
- 19. Every case of illness and accident must be reported immediately to the hostel authorities.
- 20. No function or celebration shall be organized at hostel premises except with the permission of the Warden.
- 21. Students suffering from contagious disease will not be allowed to stay at hostel. Decision of the Warden in this regard will be final and binding.
- 22. Allotment of room furniture etc. will be entirely at the discretion of the Warden and no complaint in this regard will be entertained.
- 23. All matters relating to differences among students and complaints against theft shall be brought to the notice of the hostel management. No police complaint will be lodged by the student before taking prior permission from the hostel management.
- 24. Any complaint from the neighbors/society will result in strict action.
- 25. Hostel accommodation (room) can be changed by the management if they found it necessary at any point of time.
- 26. Students indulging in use of abusive and threatening language, physical fights, use of force to get unfair act accomplished, etc. will be punished. Further, they are liable to be expelled from the hostel/Institute.
- 27. Playing music/record player etc. loud enough to cause disturbance to neighbor(s) is prohibited. Defaulters will be punished. Repeated acts will render cancellation of allotment of Hostel room.

### **Inaugural Session:**

Pioneer Institute of Professional Studies, Indore organized a National Seminar on "Institutional Quality Improvement: Role of Governance, Leadership and Management". This Seminar was sponsored by NAAC, organized by IQAC. Delegates from all walks of life confirmed their presence in the Inaugural Session of the conference. Dr. NarendraDhakad, Additional Director, Higher Education was the Chief Guest; Dr. JanakPalta, Director at Jimmy McGilligan Centre for Sustainable Development, Sangini Cancer Care Society at Indore was the Key Note Speaker; Dr. CA Pramod Kumar Jain, Chairman, Pioneer Institute, Dr. CA Prashant Jain, Executive Director and Dr. Mona Tawar, Director & Seminar Convener, were present in the Inaugural Session of the conference.





The Inaugural Session started by welcoming the Guests, preceded by Saraswati Vandana, where all the Dignitaries and Directors lightened the lamp.

It was then followed by Institute Presentation, demonstrating Mission, Vision, Quality Policy, Institute Infrastructure and Placement Records of the Institute. The Presentation was highly appreciated by the Dignitaries, congratulating the Management on the growth and progression of the Institute.









Welcome Address by Dr. CA. Pramod Kumar Jain

Dr. Pramod Kumar Jain, Principal gave a welcome speech. He said that we are all interested in quality in education. The future of our country and the world depends on our students receiving the best instruction.

Using the framework of quality in our Institutes, we can design roadmaps for continuous improvement. When educators understand what continuous improvement is all about, they gain confidence that they can shape and alter the nature of their schools. Change is possible. To policy-makers, quality maintenance in academic institutions is possible only with autonomy, semester pattern, deemed university status, student exchange programs, accreditation, credit-based system and job-oriented courses. Nobody is denying the fact that these are sophisticated tools for rendering quality education. But my question is how many academic institutions are equipped to introduce these westernized tools?





Today we have a general feeling that the moral, social and political standards in the country, and the great values of life are fast deteriorating. This situation has manifested into widespread violence, terrorism, corruption, gender injustice, communal clashes and various unpatriotic acts. We are facing a crisis-of-character. If our country is to be saved

from this chaotic condition, the reform process has to start immediately. When deterioration is seen all around, one is bewildered as to which direction the reform process has to start with. The social reformers feel that the reform has to start with the educational sector, because it is directly engaged with the molding of the character and mental development of the younger generation. And here comes the role of governance, management and leadership, together to make joint efforts to improve Institutional Quality.

The Educational Ministry, University Grants Commission, AICTE, and other regulatory bodies have been constantly addressing this problem by conducting periodical seminars, workshops and conferences involving policy makers, administrators, vice chancellors, principals and the teachers, to obtain their views and enhance the quality of higher education. But there is a greater confusion regarding an acceptable definition for the word `quality'. It has different meanings to different people.

The Management, Leaders of the Institutions and Teachers, who cater for the needs of the rural students, believe that they have rendered quality education if they have succeeded in making them obtain degrees with decent grades, and if they have entered into the job market. It is because they have labored to make these students shed their initial phobia about higher education, instilled in them the confidence to face the examinations, provided them with simplified course materials, assisted them in improving their English since most of them come from vernacular medium schools and motivated them regarding the need to equip themselves with other skills, to face the challenges of life in this competitive world.

### I believe that we should evolve mechanisms and procedures for:

- Ensuring timely, efficient and progressive performance of academic, administrative and financial tasks
- The relevance and quality of academic and research programs
- Equitable access to and affordability of academic programs for various sections of society
- Optimization and integration of modern methods of teaching and learning
- The credibility of evaluation procedures
- Ensuring the adequacy, maintenance and functioning of the support structure and services
- Research sharing and networking with other institutions in India and abroad.

# He concluded by saying that the Role of Governance, Leaders and Management should focus on four things:

- Be clear what kinds of learning we value to get teaching really focused on this learning;
- Invest in effective professional development;
- Evaluate, and measure properly, teaching quality using multiple sources of validated evidence to support diagnostic and constructive improvement and
- Whenever we make a change, evaluate its impact as robustly as we can.

Education has existed in a pre-scientific world, where good measurement of anything important is rare and evaluation is done badly or not at all. It is now a time where we should establish a more scientific approach.

### About the Seminar by Dr. Mona Tawar; Director & Seminar Convener

Dr. Mona started her speech by thanking all the Director, Dignitaries and Delegates for showing their overwhelming response towards the seminar.

Congruent with National Conferences & Seminars held at Pioneer Institute of Professional Studies, Indore since 1996, the institute has organized Days National Seminar on Institutional Quality Improvement: Role of Governance, Leadership and Management Sponsored by NAACthat continues to be an established form for educators and researchers, to share their ideas and research results with other researchers and thinkers in the field, interchange feedback sharpen their own ideas.

### Address by Dr. JanakPalta; Key Note Speaker of the Seminar

# She is the Director at Jimmy McGilligan Centre for Sustainable Development, Sangini Cancer Care Society at Indore.

Dr. Palta gave a presentation that was focused on Research and Development of Community, Collaboration, Women and Students and started by saying that her home is self-sufficient on the energy as she is having set of solar cookers ranging from the box type to different types of reflectors. The reflectors are foldable and light, and can be transported easily from one place to another. The entire meal is cooked using these solar cookers. The reflectors are bigger and powerful. She does not believe in purchasing vegetables from outside.





She has a huge solar panel on top of her home. There's also a windmill. Dr. Palta contributes her excess power to the neighboring tribes for lighting up the area. She has also taught tribal women to be self-sufficient and be independent. She addressed by saying that a leader should adopt participative style of leadership and should be with the followers all the time. This ensures a better quality and keeps employees motivated.

She started her journey with renewable energy, started at the Barli Institute, an organization that she and Jimmy set up to train young women from disadvantaged backgrounds. In her lecture she said that Jimmy built a good part of the house, where Dr. Janak now stays.

She narrated captivating story of how there were solar reflectors set up with the help of the Ministry of Renewable Energy at various locations across India.

She said that Jimmy McGilligan, veteran social workers with their life time experience, has run this Jimmy McGilligan Centre for Sustainable Development in village Sanawadiya after their retirement from Barli Development Institute for Rural Women.

This Jimmy McGilligan Centre for Sustainable Development has been named after Jimmy McGilligan for his dedicated services for more than twenty five years.

With this, the Inaugural Session was over, followed by various thought-provoking sessions.

#### SESSION I: DR. MANGALMISHRA

Dr. MangalMishra,Professor Shri Cloth Market KanyaVanijyaMahavidyalaya, Indore, Madhya Pradeshfocused onRole and Styles of Leadership and Management by saying that to develop any institution the leader and management plays a significant role. A leader must consider all the people in decision makingand work with all in full co-operation. It is the need of the hour to have a comprehensive curriculum that aims to have students leave college with a nationally-recognized qualification; excellent, well-resourced facilities in an attractive environment; a student-support system that promotes a safe, caring environment; an innovative and effective leadership program; a house and vertical form system designed to ensure every student is involved, encouraged and supported and a wide range of co-curricular opportunities.

#### SESSION II: DR. SHRIRAM PARIHAR

Dr. ShriramPariharsaid that "A creative man is motivated by the desire to achieve". He focused on Accreditation Authorities and their Roles, Academic Improvement and further said that Institutional quality can only be achieved if the team and members are dedicated and strong. He focused on the importance of IQAC and the seven criteria identified by NAAC to serve as the basis of its assessment procedures:

- Curricular Aspects
- Teaching-Learning and Evaluation
- Research, Consultancy and Extension
- Infrastructure and Learning Resources
- Student Support and Progression
- Governance, Leadership and Management
- Innovations and Best Practices





He said that Rabindranath Tagore said I don't want to live in Beautiful house, but I want to live in hut with a beautiful life. We have to progress with a little source and resources, as already covered in the definition of management. He said that it is important to learn and use English and other languages, but one should not forget our national language Hindi, which needs to be used for the development and growth of the students, thus institutions.

He said that the college campus should be the anti-ragging campus and students must not get involved in wrong activities. They need to be determined and have strong will power.

He said that we should make a group of Alumni that must meet in 1 or 2 times in a year which increases the chances of employability, thus Institutional Quality. He focused on an ideal college parameters:

- Good building, infrastructure with sufficient facilities;
- A huge collection of books and good Library;
- A talented stuff of faculty
- Good students

#### SESSION III: DR. RAMESH KASETWAR

#### **ROLE OF ACCREDITATION AUTHORITIES:**

Dr. Ramesh Kasetwar is the Founder Trustee & CEO in Quality Plus, Pune, a charitable trust registered under BPT Act 1950 for the purpose of bringing in / improvement of quality in the system of higher education. The efforts are designed to ensure employability of students immediately after their graduation. Currently he is engaged in providing consultancy / mentoring at various institutions of higher education.

In his session, he emphasized on the Institutes, especially autonomous institutes, and said that through their curriculum, should provide information, awareness, wisdom, and character to the students. Knowledge enables them to comprehend what they absorb in relation to what they already know, and creates an ability to generalize from their experiences. Honesty, integrity, initiative, curiosity, truthfulness, cooperativeness, self-esteem, and ability to work individually and in team is a skill and should be developed.

Educational Institutions must also pay attention to all the areas defined by NAAC towards quality improvement.

The impetus for improving quality of higher education and scrutiny by NAAC should be of prime importance. The entire important criterion should be adopted in the field of education, to diagnose a system and identify potentials for improvement.





### SESSION III: DR. RAMESH KASETWAR

### **ROLE OF ACCREDITATION AUTHORITIES:**

He said that NAAC Methodology is best in the world. He also added about role of each person of the institute from peon to higher authorities. He said that all the below mentioned are responsible for Institutional Quality:



- Board of Director(s)
- Legal and regulatory frame work
- Organizational Hierarchy
- Monitoring and internal control
- Transparency & accountability
- Policies and Procedures
- 1. Quality and quantity of the skilled manpower i.e. output from the HEs determine the competency of the economic leadership of any world society in the global market.
- 2. There are 2 types of Governance. Good Governance is vital both for gaining and maintaining public trust.

### **Evidence of good Governance**

- Integrity in appointments at all level.
- Learn and competent administration

He said that if we see the survey report we found that less than 30% students found to be employable. More than 70% students are not found employable due to lack of required technical, applied and behavioral skills.

Teaching is an art not science. Faculty should be willing to learn continuously.

He define MANAGEMENT Manage the man.

### **DAY II: 27.09.14**

#### SESSION V: DR. P. K. JAIN: TRAINING AND PLACEMENT

Dr. Jain laid stressed on the Importance of Co-Curricular Activities and said that CCA imparts diversified values to students that include Educational value, Psychological Values, Development of Social Values, Development of Civic Values, Physical Development Values, Recreational Values, and Cultural Values. Co-curricular activities facilitate in the development of various domains of mind and personality such as intellectual development, emotional development, social development, moral development and aesthetic development. Creativity, Enthusiasm, and Energetic, Positive thinking are some of the facets of personality development and the outcomes of extracurricular activities.





These activities are really important as they have a potential of developing the intellect of a student which is always not possible with theoretic procedures. For this co-curricular activities need to be effective so that they can give the right exposure to the mind. When effective, these activities provide a practical hands-on approach to the students which provide similar experiences which they will face in the outside world. Such experiences go a long way in producing multi-faceted personalities which, in due course of time may bring honor to the country as well. Students have a right to a broad education.

A wide range of activities prepare students better for the future, especially in today's uncertain world. Co-curricular activities need to be more refined, varied and interesting so as to be widely accepted and successful. A successful co-curriculum builds links between the school and the wider community, bringing local enthusiasts in to work with students, and sending students out to work on community projects. Many students have talents in all sorts of different areas, and it is wrong to force them to specialize too early. A career is not the only part of an adult's life but an Institution needs to make sure they have interests and skills that will help them in their family and leisure lives too. Through equal balancing of academic and co-curriculum, the students have the chance to exercise their rights and the opportunity to be multi-talented.

#### SESSION VI: DR. NISHITH DUBEY

Dr. NishithDubey is Professor- Entrepreneurship, at National Institute of Technical Teacher's Training Institute and Research, Bhopal. He is Ph.D. in Management, M.E. in Industrial Engineering and Management and M.B.A in Marketing Management. He has 26 years of academic and corporate exposure. He also has F.D.P. to his credit from world famous E.D.I.I.His area of interest includes Entrepreneurship, Intrapreneurship, Operations Management, Strategic Management, Service Marketing and Education Technology.





He focused on the Role of Central Government Bodies and State Government Bodies and related to Students' Development. His main focus area was Entrepreneurship and Intrapreneurship Development. Both the Central Government and various State Governments are taking increased interest in promoting the growth of entrepreneurship.

In his Session, he said that Institutions must encourage students to form new businesses and help in providing government support as tax incentives, buildings, roads, and a communication system to facilitate this creation process. The encouragement by the central and state governments should continue in future as more lawmakers are realizing that new enterprises create jobs and increase the economic output of the region. Every state government should develop its own innovative industrial strategies for fostering entrepreneurial activity and timely development of the technology of the area. The states should have their own state-sponsored venture funds, where a percentage of the funds have to invest in the ventures in the states. Before starting a venture, keep in mind various rules and Regulations of Central Government and State Government Bodies. He concluded the session by saying that one needs to be brave and take risks.

### SESSION VII: DR. NISHITH DUBEY

In the next session, Dr. Dubeyshowed documentaries and movies and related them to various Management Lessons from various Videos. He made the audience learn the following:

- 1. Adapt, Change Quickly, do whatever your conscious says, provided it should be as per the laws applicable
- 2. Demand quality from yourself and your team
- 3. Hire people who are excellent and ready to govern
- 4. Be great at selling your product
- 5. Care for your brand

- 6. Entrepreneurship is not like a Bollywood movie, with a happy ending. One needs to face all the ups and downs.
- 7. Be prepared to take face challenges
- 8. Commitment to work contract
- 9. Independent decision making
- 10. Creative problem solving: generate new ideas or innovative solutions
- 11. Persistence information seeking, concern for high quality work and self-appraisal
- 12. Efficiency orientation
- 13. Don't do it just for the money
- 14. Don't withdraw and do not be coward, or you will shut your doors to success





### SESSION VIII: DR P. N. MISHRA

Dr. Mishra, in his speech connected Institutional quality with the leadership of Bhagvat Gita. As an integral part of any Institution, an employee must dohis duty with devotion, and meditation, integrating many different threads of Indian philosophy. Institution building maybe viewed as a function and interdependence of four conceptual dimensions, namely: leadership role, environmental effect, competencies and institutional image gained.

An ideal Leader should act like a bow, which gives guidance and direction to an arrow to reach its target. It is that binds the integral part or components of an institution into one functional and united whole; and the force that pushes an institution focus towards its goal and objective.

The role of Governance and Administrator has a role in initiating change or an agent of change in the institution and community. They should bridge the gap between the institution and the community or the environment.






## Social & Entrepreneurship Cell Stall by Rotary Paul Harris School, Indore on Occasion of Rakshabandhan

## Visit to Mahesh Drishtiheen Kalyan Sangh Indore







The application form that is being used to apply for 12A Registration is form 10A. The application takes about 3-4 months. Application for the purpose of registration under section 12A can be applied to the Commissioner of Income tax department (Exemption) having jurisdiction over the institution.



Mantra-Chaya has no other branch in Indore but has one in Ujjain, which was supervised by Indore Branch. The History of Matra-Chaya speaks about the rate of orphans were much more as compared to the parent condition. However, the cleanliness, care etc are same as it was in past.



Founder: Shri Chandraprakash Agrawal is the founder and the donor of this organization.

**Registration:**Matra-Chaya is a registered organization by five other organizations. Its registration no. is IND 218895.

#### Aim:

The main aim of Matrachaya is to provide a platform for Orphans and Medically Mentally Retired. They provide these children for adoption too.



#### Vision:

The vision of Matra-Chaya is to provide better future to the Orphans. The proper care taking is given to them. They generally find them either from jungles or drains. Their process of accepting the child is as such: They go to police stations and check whether so and so are reported or not for missing/lost child. Then they wait for 15 days. Then if child welfare organization (CWO) permits them, then they legally take the custody of the child. They send the child for medical treatments to check whether the child is medically fit or not.

There are presently 10-12 children present there. Almost all of them are below 1 year. They just drink Nestle Milk, which is provided to them in the organization by their regular donors. There 12 children; four of them are physically handicapped.

From 1990 to present, 250 children are adopted. The best thing about Matra-Chaya organization is Secularism. There are no discrimination between girls and boys, white and black. All are treated equally. However, the most disappointing factor about our society is that in Matra-Chaya 80% of Children are girls. Still there is discrimination in our society between girls and boys. Still, people of our society do not respect girls.

### **Source of Funding:**

Some of the regular donors of Matra-Chaya organization are Nestle, Big Bazar, Metro, Software companies etc. Sunday is the adoption day of the organization. However, the children there have less resistance power.

They enjoy there by watching T.V., Playing games etc. Donors donate fruits, cloths, games and all of their necessities from 1990 to present, 4-5 children were found in palanquin in Matra-Chaya.

There various donors come to celebrate birthdays. They give various gifts to the children. The care takers in Matra-Chaya have their regular body checkup. Matra-Chaya has online facility for the adoption process. They have their own webpage adoption mp.3.it's very clean and strict environment found there.

Based on government guidelines, they give child for adoption. There are various steps before giving a child for adoption-:

Whether the person who is adopting the child is economically fit for his/her survivals. Their salary should be 30,000/month.

They visit the person who is adopting the child, home what are the conditions in which the child will be living.

For the adoption, they follow number system strictly ignoring all other criteria.

There is always waiting list for the adoption. For the physically Handicapped children, they have tie up with M.Y. Hospital, Indore. For 2 years they check by visiting the house of the people who have adopted the child as their guardians that how they are treated.





### **Conclusion:**

The best thing we observed in Matra-Chaya was that, their head, Mr. Narayan Sir. He is very socialistic kind of man.

In this present scenario, there are still socialistic people existing. There are people who care about the orphans. There are donors who donate for them. Another thing was secularism. There are still people who do not give importance to gender. However, the worst thing was still girls are not accepted in this society. Still people think girls are black mark on this society.

activities might include human rights, environmental, or development work. An NGO's level of operation indicates the scale at which an organization works, such as local, regional, national, or international.






